

| Class 1: | Jesus, Son of God (selections from Mark 1-5) Authority as teacher over death, nature, evil spirits, sin, and man |

| Class 2: | The Crucifixion (Mark 15:33-39) Why did Jesus die? Jesus, our substitute and ransom |
| Class 3: | The Resurrection (Mark 16:1-8; Acts 10:39-43; Mark 8) Christ victorious over sin. Our personal resurrection and eternal judgment |
| Class 4: | Salvation by Grace, Not Works (Mark 7:20-23; Ephesians 2:8-9) Salvation by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone |
| Class 5: | What is a Christian? Repentance (Mark 1:15, 8:34-38, 9:43-48) A radical turning from sin and to Christ |
| Class 6: | What is a Christian? Faith (Mark 5:25-34, 10:13-16; John 5:24) Believing God and trusting in him for our very lives |

Review

Prediction – God's Plan

Resurrection Event (Mark 16:1-8)

Evidence (John 20-21)

Implication For Our Lives 2. All people will be *raised* (Acts 10:42, 14:14-15; John 5:28-29)

2. All people will be *judged* by Jesus (Mark 8:38, 16:19; Acts 10:42; Rom 2:6) 8. All people will be *divided* into two groups (Mark 8:38, 16:16; Acts 10:43; Matt 13:47-50)

9. The division is *forever* (Mark 10; Heb 9:27; Matt 25:31-42)

Conclusion

Rom 6:6-9 - "For we know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin – because anyone who has died has been freed from sin. Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. For we know that since Christ was raised form the dead, he cannot die again; death no longer has mastery over him. The death he died, he died to sin once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God."

Conclusion

What is repentance? By putting Christ first as you...

- 1. Turn from sin
- 2. Trust in Jesus

The Result:

3. Obey his commands (The fruit of true repentance will be true, grace-motivated, gratitude-driven obedience before God.)

Repentance

What is a Christian? (Mark 1:15)

<u>Faith</u>

1. Trust in Jesus and His Word (Mark 5:21-24, 35-43)

2. Trust Jesus as your Lord, not just your Savior (Mark 5:24b-34, Mark 8:38, Mark 10:17-31)

3. Trust Jesus with Unwavering Childlike Trust and Personal Commitment (Mark 10:13-16)

4. Trust in God's Promise to Save Those Who Believe (John 5:24-27)

Summary

- 1. Knowledge of Jesus' accomplishment on the cross and resurrection know
- 2. *Acknowledge* what God has done in Christ and that we are sinners in need of a savior <u>repent</u>
- 3. *Personal Trust* trust without shame, trust like that of a child to a loving parent, and trust that God accepts me **believe**

God's Gifts for Those Who Repent and Believe

Mark 1:8 - we will have the ________. And, Mark 2:10 - our sins will be _______. And, Mark 10:30 - we will have _______

Personal Decision

Repenting and believing is a personal decision. No one can make it for you.

"A Christian, then, is someone who recognizes that Jesus Christ has the right to control his or her life. They recognize that they are rebels against Jesus Christ and deserve to be punished. A Christian believes that Jesus Christ died for him or her on the Cross taking the punishment which their sins deserved. A Christian is a person who has responded to God's call to repent. They have turned from rebelling against Jesus and submitted to Him. This person knows that he or she has been forgiven. They know that God has made them a new person and that Jesus lives in their life. They know this because they see their changed desires, attitudes and behavior. This person trusts God with his or her life." (*Me? A Christian*, pg. 7)

Will you become a Christian, today?

"For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it. What good is it for a man to gain the whole world, yet forfeit his soul?" (Mark 8:35)
